With the participation in the South Asian Games, the players started getting exposure outside the country and the federation is aiming to have an elite permanent national players, so as to gain popularity in the game of Badminton, where it will be an eye opener for the other youngster/children to participate in the game of badminton and finally to continue the development of badminton in the country.

Administration:

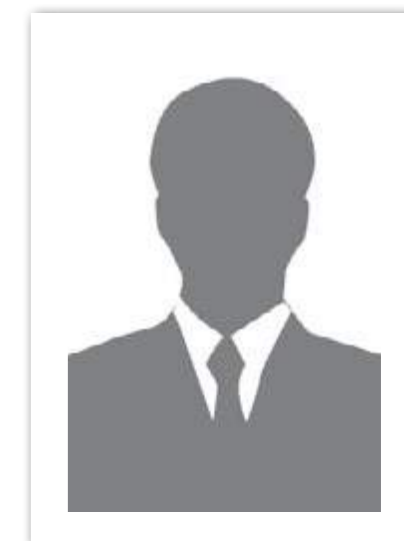

On December 14, 2012, Gita Wirjawan was elected as the Chairman of Indonesian Badminton Association (Persatuan Bulutangkis Seluruh Indonesia, "PBSI") for the 2012-2016 period. Wirjawan set the goal of returning Indonesia to the top ranks of badminton, as the country was in the 1970s and 1980s. He invited former Indonesian badminton legends such as Susi Susanti, Rexy Mainaky, Rudy Hartono and Tan Yoe Hok to actively engage in the organization. To ensure the athletes can still get formal education while in training, Wirjawan set up a 'home-school' for athletes inside the training camp. Under his chairmanship, Indonesia has so far won three gold medals at the World Championships, 4 titles at the All England Championships, overall champion at the Southeast Asian Games in 2013 and 2015 and 2 titles at the 2014 Asian Games in Incheon, South Korea.

WD Takahashi/Matsutomo won Indian Open, MS Kento Momota won Singapore Open and Indonesia Open which is the first SSP title for Japan. Then, we won 3 bronze medals in World Championships, MS Momota, MD Hayakawa/Endo, and WD Fukuman/Yonao. After World Championships, young girls reached the Finals of Yonex Open Japan, Okuhara and Yamaguchi.

Involvement in Badminton:

Mokenov Aidar started to develop badminton in Kyrgyzstan since 2010. At that time in the whole Kyrgyzstan, there were only five people, who played badminton. Since that time, five new courts have been opened. For 6 years, 500 people visited these courts and played badminton. In the year 2012 the Badminton and Squash Federation of the Kyrgyzstan was established and Mokenov Aidar was elected as President. In the year 2010 there were no badminton coaches in Kyrgyzstan. As of now we have two already. If 6 years ago badminton was hardly known in Kyrgyzstan, today it is getting more popular.

In 2015,

for the first time in the history of the Kyrgyzstan badminton was included in university curricula. We started to teach badminton at the American University in Central Asia. For the first time in the history of Kyrgyzstan regular badminton classes for students have been organized. 20 students enrolled the badminton course at this university.

Partly the contribution of the Badminton Korea Association, which granted the Badminton and Squash Federation of the Kyrgyzstan with 30 badminton rackets last year, made this achievement possible. Mokenov Aidar and Tatyana Petrova are coaches at these classes for students. Last year, the badminton master class was held for students and journalists. Also, the geography of badminton development in Kyrgyzstan has widened in the last year.

Rackets, shuttlecocks and nets along with educational materials were granted to remote rural sports club, which is 400 km away from Bishkek. Now badminton is played there also. Badminton and Squash Federation of the Kyrgyzstan is actively working with schools and universities in Kyrgyzstan to promote badminton and offers help in building tennis courts and organizing training exercises.

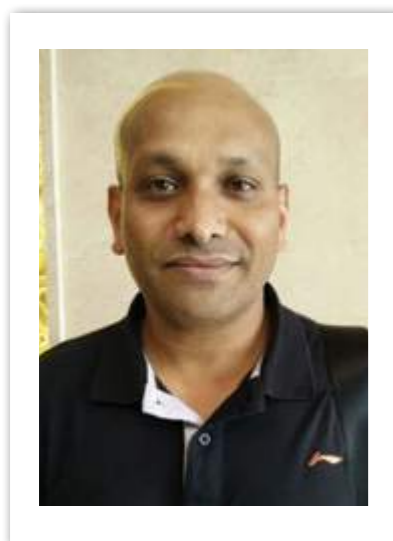

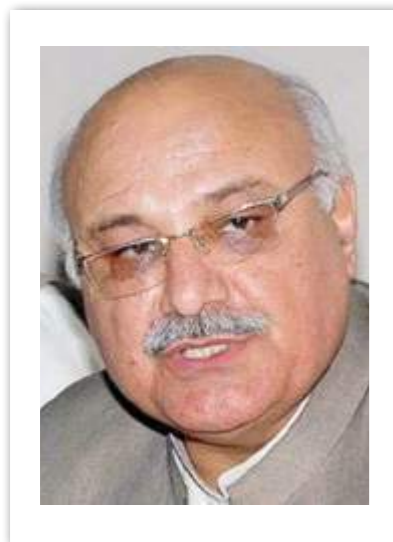

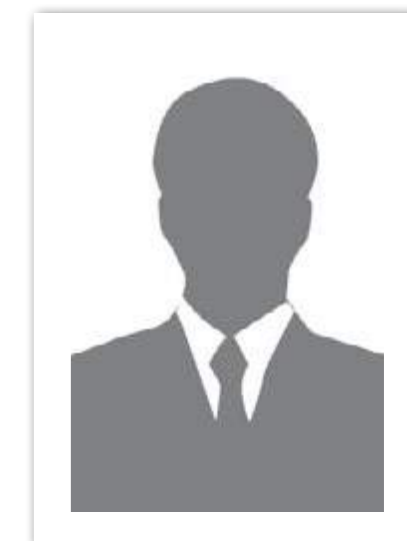

- 2.1 Two (2) Badminton Asia Logo A- Boards per court (one (1) at the baseline opposite TV camera and one (1) at the sideline: from the first day of competition.
- 2.2 Two (2) Score boards per court from the first day of competition.
- 2.3 Each match on each court must have an umpire and a service judge, from the first day of competition.
- 2.4 A minimum of three (3) line-judges per match per court from the first day of the competition.
- 2.5 Use of BWF approved shuttlecocks as per **"General Competition Regulations 27.10 Shuttles"**
Approved shuttlecocks can be found at <http://bwfcorporate.com/about/approved-shuttles/>.
- 2.6 Clothing Regulations:
 - 2.6.1 Name of player is MANDATORY from the first day of the event.
 - 2.6.2 Colour clothing of the pair must be the same from Quarter Finals onwards.

- 2.7 Clothing Regulations:

In view to maximize entries and to avoid many withdrawals in the upcoming Badminton Asia Championships 2016, it was decided that the Events Committee has the authority to decide and form what is best possible format and regulations of the Championships.

Amendments to the regulation of Badminton Asia Championships to ensure it is more robust and to maintain the integrity of the event at Super Series level, as follow:

- 8.1 To limit the entries for each event category at 32.
- 8.2 Badminton Asia to reserve one wild card per event category and it will be reserve for players identified and recommended by development department under their ADT programme (Asian Development Team). The actual entry quota for ranking eligibility for each event is 31.



8.3 Item 5.2, “*Shall any country who had player(s)/pair(s) ranked 1–32 but withdraw , the particular entry (place) will be given to the player(s)/pair(s) next highest ranking from the same country as long as the Eligibility Quota stipulated in 5.1*”

8.4 Item 7.3, “*For doubles events (Men’s, Women’s and Mixed) the exemption from the administrative fine (in 7.1 above) will be considered by Badminton Asia, if the players are no longer playing as a pair, and this MUST be communicated by writing to Badminton Asia before the Dateline Confirmation by Countries on Entries from Eligibility (Phase 1), Week 6 (Friday), 39 days from the start of the Tournament.*

The players concern SHALL NOT play as a pair in any BWF/ Badminton Asia sanctioned Event for the next six (6) month after the Badminton Asia Championships. Failing which, Badminton Asia will impose an administrative fine of US\$ 4,000.00 due to falsification of information.”

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

1. Corporate Information

The principal activities of the Confederation are those of promoting, managing and developing the sport in Asia in principles of specificity and universality.

The Confederation is registered in Malaysia under the Societies Act, 1966.

2. Basis of Preparation and Significant Accounting Policies

(a) Basis of preparation

The financial statement of the Confederation has been prepared in accordance with the provisions of the Malaysian Financial Reporting Standards ("MFRS"), International Financial Reporting Standards and the requirements of the Companies Act, 1965 in Malaysia.

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention except as disclosed in summary of significant accounting policies.

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with MFRS requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements, and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reported period. It also requires Councils to exercise their judgment in the process of applying the Confederation's accounting policies. Although these estimates and judgment are based on the Councils' best knowledge of current events and actions, actual results may differ. The areas involving a higher degree of judgment or complexity, or areas where assumptions and estimates are significant to the financial statements are disclosed in Note 2(b).

(b) Significant accounting estimates, assumptions and judgements

Estimates, assumptions concerning the future and judgements are made in the preparation of the financial statements. They affect the application of the Confederation's accounting policies, reported amounts of assets, liabilities, income and expenses, and disclosures made. They are assessed on an on-going basis and are based on historical experience and other relevant factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

The key assumption concerning the future and other key sources of estimation or uncertainty at the reporting date, that has a significant risk of causing a material adjustment within the next year relates to depreciation of property, plant and equipment.

The costs of property, plant and equipment are depreciated on a straight-line basis over the useful lives of the property, plant and equipment. Management estimates the useful lives of the property, plant and equipment to be 2 to 50 years as stated in Note 2(c). These are common life expectancies applied in the industries. Changes in the expected level of usage and technological developments could impact the economic useful lives and the residual values of these assets, therefore future depreciation charges could be revised. The carrying amount of the Confederation's property, plant and equipment as at 31 December 2015 are stated in Note 3 to the financial statements.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

2. Basis of Preparation and Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

(c) Property, plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment is stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses. The policy of recognition and measurement of impairment losses is in accordance with Note 2(d).

Property, plant and equipment are depreciated on a straight line method at rates calculated to write off the cost of these assets to their residual value over their estimated useful lives as follows:

Depreciation methods, useful lives and residual values are reassessed at the reporting date.

When significant parts of an item of property, plant and equipment have different useful lives, they are accounted for as separate items (major components) of property, plant and equipment.

Gains or losses on disposals are determined by comparing net disposal proceeds with carrying amount and are included in the income and expenditure account.

(d) Impairment of non-financial assets

Assets that have an indefinite useful life, such as goodwill, or intangible assets not ready to use, are not subject to amortisation and are tested annually for impairment. Assets that are subject to amortisation and depreciation are reviewed for impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount may not be recoverable.

For the purpose of impairment testing, assets are grouped together into the smallest group of assets that generates cash inflows from continuing use that are largely independent of the cash inflows of other assets or cash-generating units.

The recoverable amount of an asset or cash-generating unit is the greater of its value in use and its fair value less costs to sell. In assessing value in use, the estimated future cash flows are discounted to their present value using a pre-tax discount rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the asset or cash-generating unit.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

2. Basis of Preparation and Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

(d) Impairment of non-financial assets (continued)

An impairment loss is recognised if the carrying amount of an asset or its related cash-generating unit exceeds its estimated recoverable amount.

Impairment losses are recognised in profit or loss unless it reverses a previous revaluation in which it is charged to the revaluation surplus. Impairment losses recognised in prior periods are assessed at the end of each reporting period for any indications that the loss has decreased or no longer exists. An impairment loss is reversed if there has been a change in the estimates used to determine the recoverable amount since the last impairment loss was recognised. An impairment loss is reversed only to the extent that the asset's carrying amount that would have been determined, net of depreciation or amortisation, if no impairment loss had been recognised. Reversals of impairment losses are credited to profit or loss in the financial year in which the reversals are recognised.

(e) Foreign Currency

(i) Functional and presentation currency

The functional currency of the Confederation is the currency of the primary economic environment in which the confederation operates. Ringgit Malaysia (RM) is the functional currency.

The financial statements of the Confederation are presented in US Dollar which is the presentation currency.

(ii) Transactions in Foreign Currencies

Transactions in foreign currencies are translated into functional currency at rates of exchange ruling at the time of transactions and where settlement had not taken place by 31 December 2015 at the approximate rates ruling as at that date. All gains and losses on exchange are included in the income and expenditure statement.

(e) Foreign Currency (continued)

(iii) Translation of Foreign Currency Financial Statements

Foreign assets and liabilities are translated into US Dollar at exchange rates ruling at the date of statement of financial position. Income and expenditure statement items are translated at the average rate of exchange for the year. The translation differences arising there from are recorded as movements in translation reserve.

(f) Financial assets

(i) Classification

The Confederation classifies its financial assets based on the purpose for which the financial assets were acquired at initial recognition in the following categories:

Financial assets at fair value through profit or loss

Fair value through profit or loss category comprises financial assets that are held for trading, including derivatives (except for a derivative that is a financial guarantee contract or a designated and effective hedging instrument) or financial assets that are specifically designated into this category upon initial recognition.

Assets in this category are classified as current assets if expected to be settled within 12 months, otherwise, they are classified as non-current assets.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

2. Basis of Preparation and Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

(2) Financial assets (continued)

Loans and receivables

Loans and receivables are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market.

They are included in current assets, except for maturities greater than 12 months after the end of the reporting period. These are classified as non-current assets.

Held-to-maturity financial assets

Held-to-maturity financial assets are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments and fixed maturities that the Confederation's management has the positive intention and ability to hold to maturity.

Held-to-maturity financial assets are included in non-current assets, except for those with maturities less than 12 months from the end of the reporting period, which are classified as current assets.

Available-for-sale financial assets

Available-for-sale financial assets are non-derivatives that are either designated in this category or not classified in any of the other categories.

They are included in non-current assets unless the investment matures or management intends to dispose of it within 12 months of the end of the reporting period.

(i) Recognition and initial measurement

Regular purchases and sales of financial assets are recognised on the trade-date, the date on which the Confederation commits to purchase or sell the asset.

Financial assets are initially recognised at fair value plus transaction costs for all financial assets not carried at fair value through profit or loss. Financial assets carried at fair value through profit or loss are initially recognised at fair value, and transaction costs are expensed in profit or loss.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

2. Basis of Preparation and Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

(f) Financial assets (continued)

(ii) Subsequent measurement

Gains and losses

Financial assets at fair value through profit or loss and available-for-sale financial assets are subsequently carried at fair value. Loans and receivables and held-to-maturity financial assets are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Changes in the fair values of financial assets at fair value through profit or loss, including the effects of currency translation, interest and dividend income are recognised in profit or loss in the period in which the changes arise.

Changes in the fair value of available-for-sale financial assets are recognised in other comprehensive income. Impairment losses and exchange differences on monetary assets are recognised in profit or loss, whereas exchange differences on non-monetary assets are recognised in other comprehensive income as part of fair value change.

Interest and dividend income on available-for-sale financial assets are recognised separately in profit or loss. Interest on available-for-sale debt securities calculated using the effective interest method is recognised in profit or loss. Dividend income on available-for-sale equity instruments are recognised in profit or loss when the Confederation's right to receive payments is established.

Impairment of financial assets

An impairment loss in respect of loans and receivables and held-to-maturity investments is recognised in profit or loss and is measured as the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the present value of estimated future cash flows discounted at the asset's original effective interest rate. The carrying amount of the asset is reduced through the use of an allowance account.

Impairment of financial assets (continued)

An impairment loss in respect of available-for-sale financial assets is recognised in profit or loss and is measured as the difference between the asset's acquisition cost (net of any principal repayment and amortization) and the asset's current fair value, less any impairment loss previously recognised. Where a decline in the fair value of an available-for-sale financial asset has been recognised in other comprehensive income, the cumulative loss in other comprehensive income is reclassified from equity to profit or loss.

An impairment loss in respect of unquoted equity instrument that is carried at cost is recognised in profit or loss and is measured as the difference between the financial asset's carrying amount and the present value of estimated future cash flows discounted at the current market rate of return for a similar financial asset.

Impairment losses recognised in profit or loss for an investment in an equity instrument classified as available for sale is not reversed through profit or loss.

If, in a subsequent period, the fair value of a financial asset measured at amortised cost and the increase can be objectively related to an event occurring after the impairment loss was recognised in profit or loss, the impairment loss is reversed, to the extent that the asset's carrying amount does not exceed what the carrying amount would have been had the impairment not been recognised at the date the impairment is reversed. The amount of the reversal is recognised in profit or loss.

(g) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash in hand, bank balances, deposits with banks and highly liquid investments which have an insignificant risk of changes in value. For the purpose of the cash flow statement, cash and cash equivalents are presented net of bank overdrafts and pledged deposits.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

2. Basis of Preparation and Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

(g) Financial liabilities

All financial liabilities are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method other than those categorised as fair value through profit or loss.

Other financial liabilities categorised as fair value through profit or loss are subsequently measured at their fair values with the gain or loss recognised in profit or loss.

Fair value through profit or loss category comprises financial liabilities that are derivatives (except for a derivative that is a financial guarantee or a designated and effective hedging instrument) or financial liabilities that are specifically designated into this category upon initial recognition.

(h) Government grant

Government grants are recognised at its fair value where there is reasonable assurance that the grant will be received and all attached conditions will be complied with.

When the grant relates to an expense item, it is recognised as income on a systematic basis over the periods in which the Confederation recognised as an expense the related costs for which the grant is intended to compensate.

(i) Income recognition

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable net to discount and rebate on an accrual basis. Revenue is recognised to the extent that it is probable that economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the Confederation.

(j) Employee benefits

(i) Short-term employee benefits

Short-term employee benefit obligations in respect of salaries, annual bonuses, paid annual leave and sick leave are measured on an undiscounted basis and are expensed as the related service is provided.

A liability is recognised for the amount expected to be paid under short-term cash bonus or profit sharing plans if the Confederation has a present legal or constructive obligation to pay this amount as a result of past service provided by the employee and the obligation can be estimated reliably.

(k) Employee benefits (continued)

(ii) Defined contribution plans

As required by law, companies in Malaysia make contributions to the state pension scheme, the Employees Provident Fund ("EPF"). Such contributions are recognised as an expense in the statement of income and expenditure in the period to which they relate.

(k) Income taxes

Income tax on the profit or loss for the year comprises current and deferred tax. Current tax is the expected amount of income taxes payable in respect of the taxable profit for the year and is measured using the tax rates that have been enacted at the reporting date.

Deferred tax is recognised on the liability method for all temporary differences between the carrying amount of an asset or liabilities in the statement of financial position and its tax base at the reporting date. Deferred tax liabilities are recognised for all taxable temporary differences and deferred tax assets are recognised for all deductible temporary differences, unused tax losses and unused tax credits to the extent that it is probable that future taxable profit will be available against which the deductible temporary differences, unused tax losses and unused tax credits can be utilised.

Deferred tax asset and liability is measured at the tax rates that are expected to apply to the period when the asset is realised or the liability is settled, based on the tax rates that have been enacted or substantially enacted by the reporting date. The carrying amount of a deferred tax asset is reviewed at each reporting date and is reduced to the extent that it becomes probable that sufficient future taxable profit will be available.

Deferred tax is recognised in the statement of income and expenditure, except when it arises from a transaction which is recognised directly in accumulated fund, in which case the deferred tax is also charged or credited directly in accumulated fund.

9. Taxation

No provision for taxation has been made during the financial year as the Confederation is exempted from tax in accordance with Section 44(6) of the Income Tax Act, 1965.

10. Financial Instruments

The Confederation's financial risk management policy seeks to ensure that adequate financial resources are available for the development of the Confederation's whilst managing its financial risk including liquidity and cash flow risk. The Confederation operates within guidelines that are approved by the Boards and the Confederation's policy is not to engage in speculative transactions.

The main areas of financial risks faced by the Confederation and the policy in respect of the major areas of treasury activity are set out as follows:

(a) Liquidity and cash flow risk

The Confederation maintains a certain level of cash and cash convertible investments to meet its working capital requirements.

(b) Foreign exchange risk

The Confederation is exposed to foreign current risk as a result of its normal operation activities when the currency domination differs from its functional currency.

The Confederation maintains a natural hedge, wherever possible, by depositing foreign currency proceeds from receipt into foreign currency bank account which will preliminary be used for payments in the same domination. Foreign exchange exposures in transactional currencies other than functional currency of the operating entities are kept to an acceptable level.

The net unhedged financial assets and financial liabilities of the confederation as at 31 December 2015 that are not dominated in the functional currency are as follows:

(c) Credit risk

Cash deposits and other receivables may give rise to credit risk which requires the loss to be recognised if a counterparty defaults on its obligations. The Confederation's exposure to credit risk arises primarily from other receivables. For other financial assets (including cash and bank balances), the Confederation minimises credit risk by dealing exclusively with high credit rating counterparties.

The credit risk with respect to other receivables are managed through the application of credit approvals, credit limits and monitoring procedures. Credit is extended to the customers based upon careful evaluation of the customer's financial condition and credit history.

The Confederation's normal credit term granted to customers ranges from 30 to 60 days. Any other credit terms are assessed and approved on a case-by-case basis depending on the length of trading relationship, the volume of trade and other management considerations.

(d) Fair values

The carrying amounts of cash and cash equivalents and other receivables and other payables approximate fair value due to the relatively short to USD nature of these financial instruments.
